From the Director, Rebecca Gromala:

Happy Holidays! I hope you are all looking forward to Winter Break and will have some time to relax and enjoy the season. As you will see in our newsletter, the first semester has been quite busy for students in both Lake Central and the School Town of Munster.

Mrs. Cvitkovich, Director of Exceptional Needs for the School Town of Munster, and I have been working closely since she started in July. We share the goal of making sure the transition away from West Lake Special Education to separate special education departments is as smooth as possible. Mrs. Cvitkovich has been quite busy meeting with various groups in order to understand the needs of the district and develop plans for programming. We will continue to work together during second semester to plan for the 2019-2020 school year.

Educators in LCSC continue to focus on our shared responsibility of ensuring that all children are held to rigorous academic standards and high expectations. Middle and high school Applied Skills teachers are working with Heidi Brett-Baker from Project SUCCESS, a resource center that supports higher academic achievement for students with disabilities. Ms. Brett-Baker spent a half-day with teachers and special education supervisors in November. The teachers reviewed the Indiana Content Connectors, which are the modified state standards for students with significant disabilities. Teachers identified what each Content Connector requires students to know and what barriers may exist that prevent students from demonstrating their knowledge. The teachers supported each other with ideas to address those barriers through instructional changes and use of technology. Teachers will continue breaking down standards prior to our next meeting with Ms. Brett-Baker in January. Our next step will be to align the curriculum in the Applied Skills classes with the scope and sequence of the corresponding general education classes. During our meeting, teachers shared stories of the academic successes they have witnessed over the course of the school year. It was apparent that students of all ability levels are rising to meet our higher expectations.

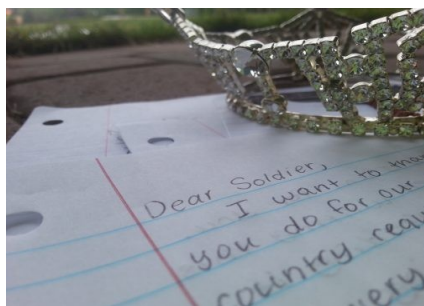

10th grade students have been practicing Creative Writing. They chose a picture of a spooky, abandoned building as their setting and were asked to write a spooky story!

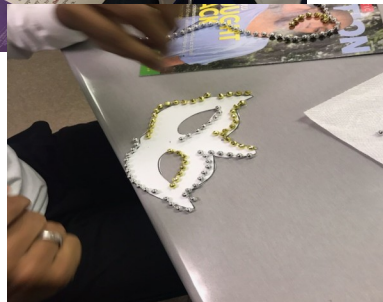
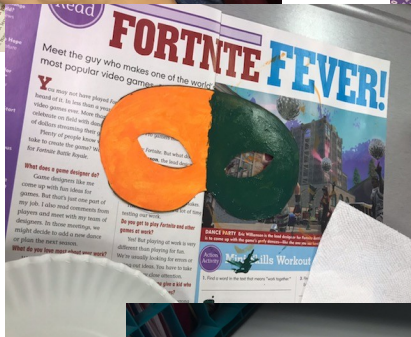
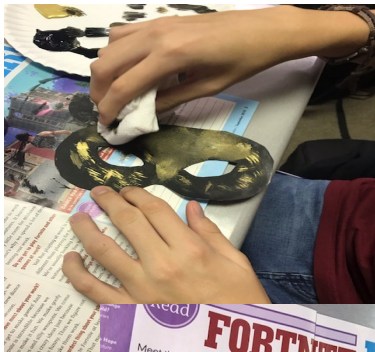

It was a Toy Story Halloween in Ms. Baird's class and even some of the other staff joined in on the fun. It was a close call when we heard Andy coming but all ended well.



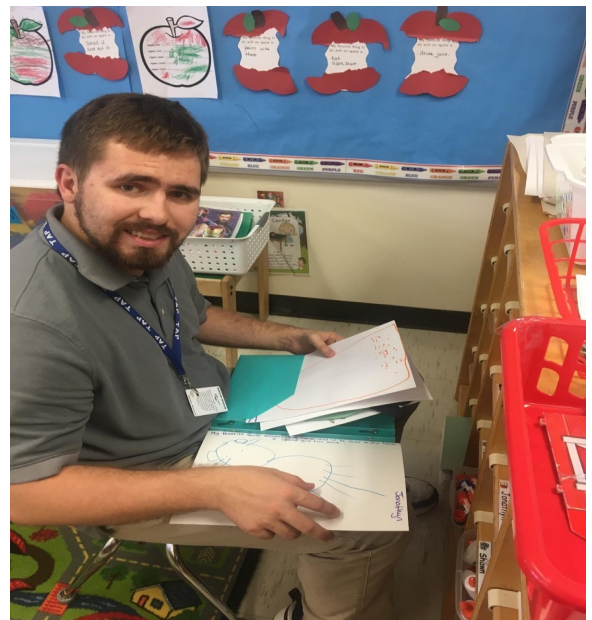

Finally, we would like to thank all parents for your continued support in sending in snacks, volunteering at class parties and supporting their learning at home. We appreciate all you do!

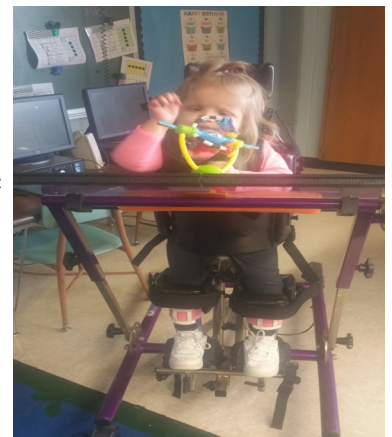

Best Buddies Munster Looks to Change Attitudes

Best Buddies has been a part of Munster High School for over eight years. In that time, our school has become a more accepting and inclusive environment. Before Best Buddies, many students with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (IDD) were isolated and did not feel a part of MHS. They were left out of most activities and knew few students outside of their own classrooms. Best Buddies has helped to build a bridge between these awesome individuals and the rest of the school. They are now a big part of our school culture. You see it in the halls, at sporting events and at dances. Best Buddies has led the way to this change.

Best Buddies, however, knows that there is still much work to do. It is not enough that we are more accepting. We need to change our attitudes about those individuals with an IDD. We want to do more than “make them happy,” a comment heard too often. Our goal is for ALL students, ALL people, whether they have an IDD or not, to be treated with respect, dignity and compassion. We want everyone to be recognized for their talents, for what they CAN DO, NOT what they cannot do. These amazing MHS students have so much they can give our school and society, and they are so often overlooked. This is a daunting task in today’s society. It is a task, however, that we must take on!

Best Buddies’ mission is to do just that! One of our goals is to “Spread the Word to End the Word.” This is an international movement that has been around for a while. There is even a Spread the Word to End the Word website! For those of you who do not know, we are talking about the R-word (Retarded). Many people have said that this is just another “Political Correctness” issue. That it is a small thing. It is actually a huge thing. The R-word used to be a term to label individuals who were looked upon as different and inferior. Now, however, the term is mostly used to ridicule someone. Let’s stop and think about this: Imagine that there is a term that has been used to describe a person, maybe you, because of something you cannot even help. You are in the Food Court and a student at the next table accidentally does something most people would be embarrassed by. After all of the laughter dies down, someone yells, “What are you _____?” (Fill in the blank with the term used to describe you.) This happening once or twice to you may not seem like big deal. What if you hear it all the time from strangers, co-workers, friends, teachers, anyone and everyone? It will take its toll. That is what the R-word does to millions of people and their families each day! People are belittled and shunned because we look at the negative! Let’s start looking at the positives! This year Best Buddies wants to end the use of the R-word!

Best Buddies plans on doing a lot to help change the attitudes of our community. Four events that have become a Best Buddies Munster tradition will take place next semester that will help us with this task. First, we will hold our 3rd Annual Best Buddies Bowl, a flag football game involving members of Best Buddies and members of the Munster High School Football Team. We are still in the planning stages, but we hope to hold it toward the end of January. In addition to Best Buddies and the Football Team, we are hoping to get other MHS clubs and organizations involved. In the past, Art Club, Project X, the Robotics Club, the Dance Team, and others, have participated in this event. The football game brings the school together and shows our community what people with IDs are capable of. The second event is our 4th Annual Autism Awareness Night at a MHS Girls’ Softball home game. The purpose is to educate the community about Autism, a type of IDD, and to bring awareness to not only those who live with Autism, but their families also. The third event is a week-long push to end the use of the R-word. One of our big activities is to get students and staff to pledge to refrain from using the R-word in all parts of life.

This year we are going to have other activities in which to promote inclusion and educate others to end the R-word. The final big event of the semester is going to be the 9th Annual Lake County Best Buddies Friendship Walk. This is held on a Saturday morning in early May at Wicker Park in Highland. The event is co-hosted by the Best Buddies chapters at MHS, Lake Central, Crown Point, Griffith, and Highland High Schools. The purpose of this event is to raise money to help Best Buddies Indiana to continue its mission throughout the state, as well as to bring awareness to people who have IDs. All of these events are open to anyone! If you want to support Best Buddies or help promote change in the attitudes toward people with IDs, come out and watch a football or softball game, take a pledge or go for a walk! Make a difference!! (Dates, times and other details to be announced).

Through all of these events and activities, Best Buddies Munster hopes to make MHS, Munster and surrounding communities understand that people with IDs are an underutilized group, who have a lot of value to add to society. Sometimes they are labeled as people who need help and who take from society, when the reality is that they can give much more than they are ever given credit for. This year, please take some time to get to know these individuals, whether they are classmates of yours, students in the class you are teaching, neighbors, co-workers, classmates of your own children, or someone working at a business you frequent. You will find a wonderful young man or woman full of energy, enthusiasm, ideas and talents that you never would know if you close your eyes to this great group of people. They have differences, but don’t we all?

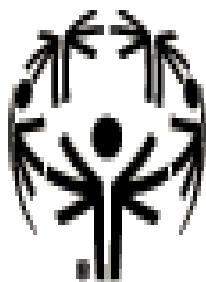
West Lake All-Star Basketball

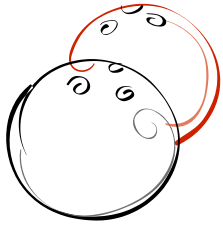

West Lake Special Olympics Track and Field

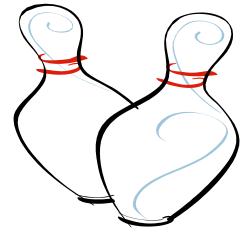
