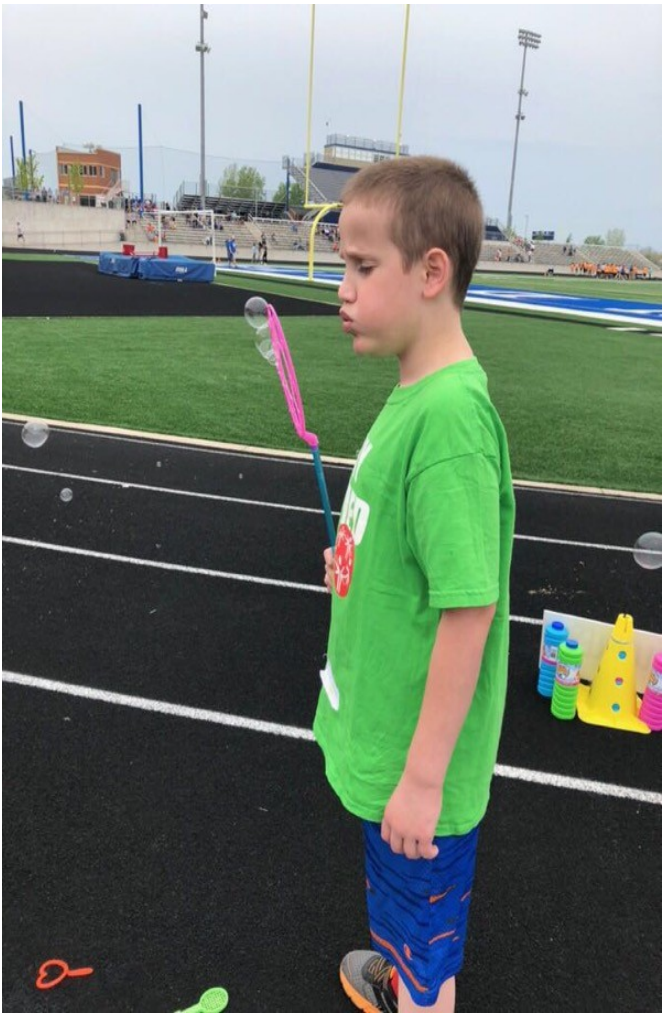

WWMS Direct Instruction Math

7th & 8th Graders Demonstrate 'Real-World' Application

This year teachers at Wilbur Wright Middle School attended several professional development meetings to brainstorm ideas for motivating and engaging students, implementing inclusion, and differentiating instruction. The end goal was to work toward standard based - student centered lessons that scaffold skill demonstration, utilize multiple student intelligences and abilities, and give ample opportunity for them to demonstrate their level of learning.

The math curriculum for the Geometry Unit generally is taught just before and right after Spring break. In past years, students were engaged in learning 2D and 3D shapes, solids, surface area and volume by measuring 2D shape nets and then constructing the 3D solid shapes from the nets.



This year students were given the opportunity to take their learning a step further and given choices for constructing a real-world structure based on the 3D solid figures in the unit lessons. Without hesitation, Mrs. Finch's direct instruction 7th and 8th grade math classes took on the architectural design challenge unanimously. Students were assigned to groups and allowed to brainstorm a design for their structure.

They could build anything they desired but it had to include all shapes from the lessons, fit on the supplied base, and they had to calculate total surface area and volume for the completed structure. Once each group had collectively decided on their structure, they crafted their net shapes and began to mold their ideas. Surprisingly, each group went above and beyond the required amount of shapes, even asking to include additional solid shapes that were not a requirement.

This was allowed if they could calculate the surface area and volume of each. The level of research, critical thinking, problem solving, and creativity that each group displayed was astounding.

The next step was to color the shapes, re-assemble the structures, and add the finer details. Students were given photos of their original ideas and allowed to tweak their design as necessary.



The last phase of the project involved students measuring the finished shapes with a ruler or tape measurer and recording the data on a chart. After all measurements were checked by the teacher, students completed a final measurement packet that included both total surface area and volume calculations for their structures, as well as a group participation rubric for their selves and group peers.

When asked if they enjoyed the project, they all agreed it was one of the best projects they had ever done. All indicated that they had learned something new (especially when calculating square units versus cubic units) and most conveyed that they hoped to do something similar in the future.

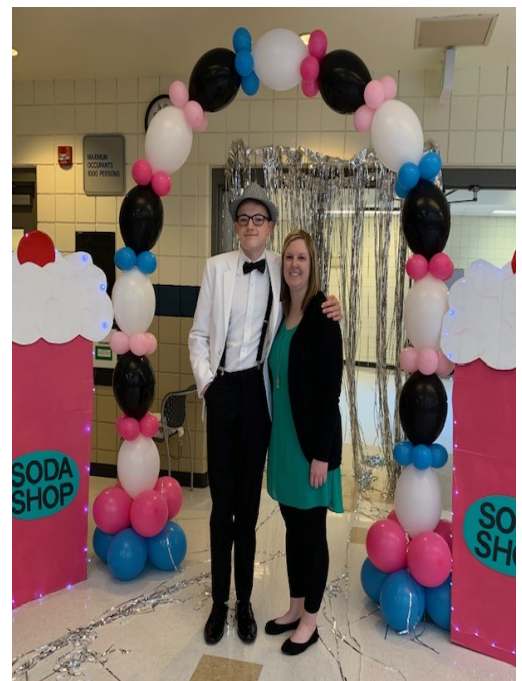

The School Town of Munster held their 1st annual Unified Sports Day and it was enjoyed by all. They are anxious to see what fun next year brings.

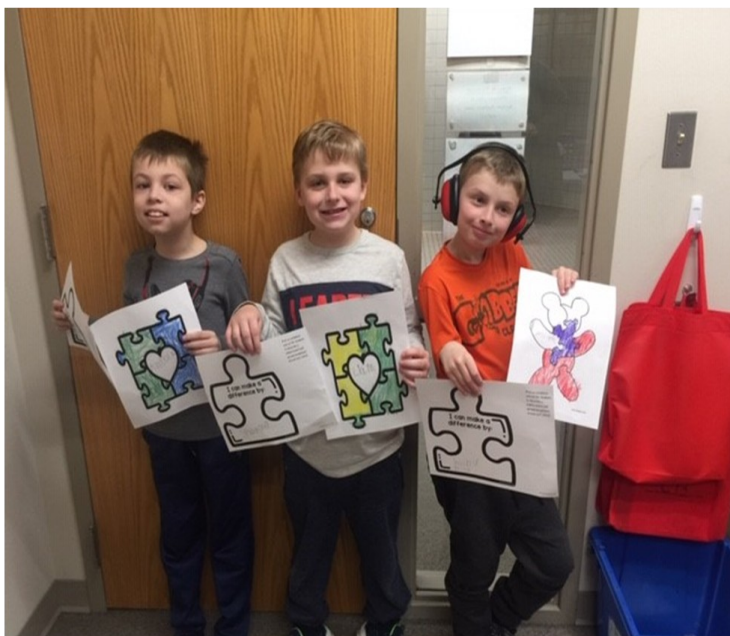
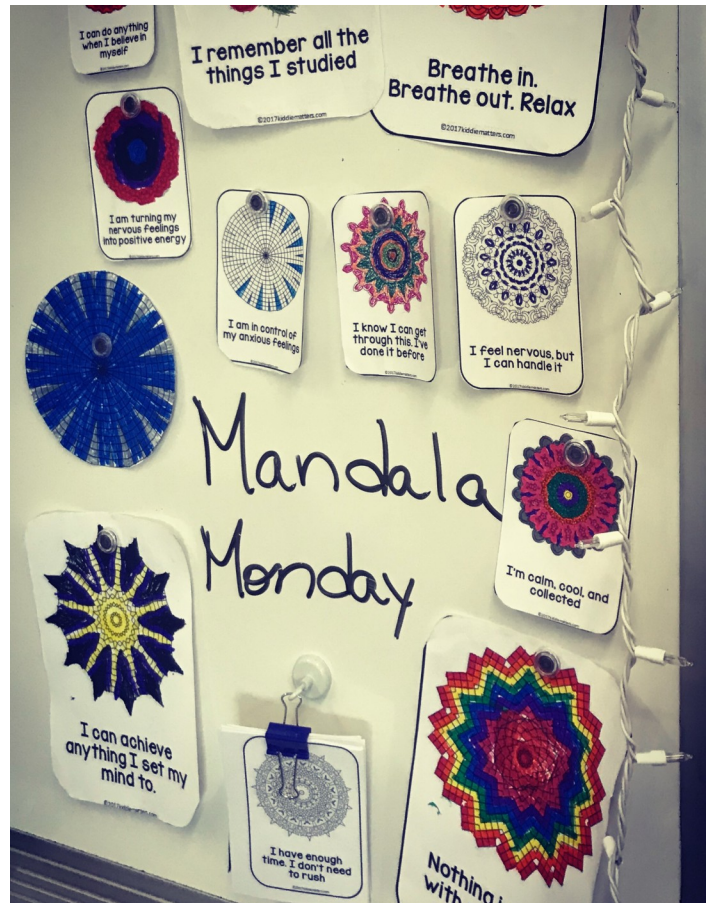


The Mandala Mantra

This school year, Lisa Rudy provided a short weekly activity every Monday to prepare for a positive week ahead. Due to the standardized testing season, Mrs. Rudy introduced a coping skill for test anxiety. The mandala mantras gave the students an opportunity to reinforce positive self-talk for the duration of the standardized tests.

The students chose a mantra that was meaningful and repeated the mantra as they colored the design. They read aloud their mantra as their peers repeated it. The students taped their mandala mantra near their testing space and read aloud each mantra prior to testing. Students were more focused and calm during their testing sessions. If a student started to escalate, Mrs. Rudy pointed to their mantra and they relaxed. The students responded well to the activity and continue to recall their mantras during their daily activities.



For the month of April, Elliott Elementary School recognized Autism Awareness Month. SLP Taylor Watrobka and SSP Anita Ilic conducted a social language group with the children pictured. They were teaching these students all about Autism. The students created puzzle pieces that expressed how they could make a difference in the lives of their peers. Tips

I would like to share some ideas for those interested in helping their child continue to learn during the vacation months.

Pre-Academics

- Read to your child
- Take regular visits to the library
- Impromptu games are a great way to incorporate learning into your daily routine. While driving, ask child to see how many items he/she can see that are red, blue...or square, circle. While in a store, ask your child to count out five items that are yellow.
- There are also several free, on-line sites which your child can get added practice in all areas such as "starfall" and sesamestreet.org.

For OT skills (strengthening hand/finger):

- Encourage your child to play with silly putty
- Cut, roll and squeeze play-dough,
- Practice zippers, buttons, hooks,
- Put paper clips onto paper-practice pre-handwriting and handwriting skills focusing on proper hand position and/or even coloring in the lines.
