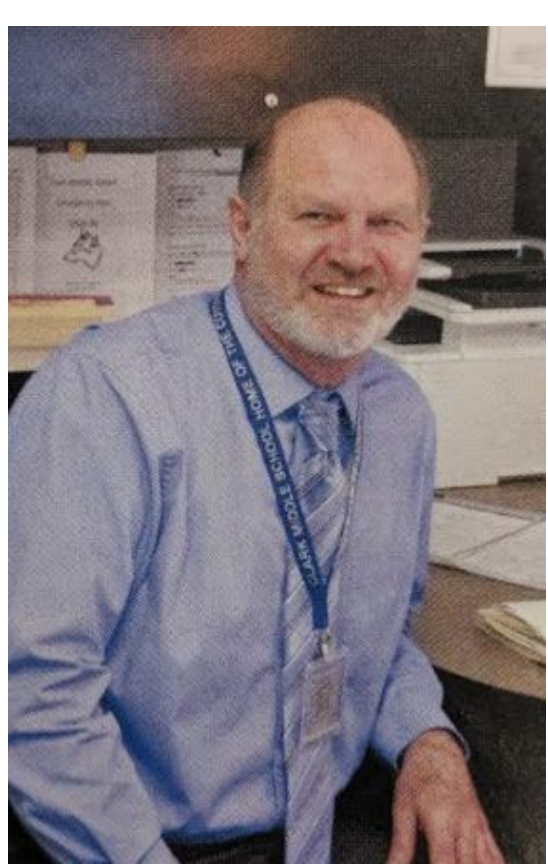

Anyway, I hope that everyone is doing well as we continue to move throughout the year. With that said, CMS has been a busy place and many important things are coming this month, so please take time to read the newsletter, check out the school website, and feel free to contact us if you have any questions.

On October 19, our PTO in conjunction with the US Attorney's Office is sponsoring a very informative presentation on "Social Media Concerns: Common Issues, Solutions, and Resources for Parents and Teachers." The meeting will take place in the LGI. Please enter door J. Refreshments will be served starting at 6:00pm. Please try and attend this important event. Topics discussed will include: Common Apps and tactics used to gain access to children through social media and other electronic means, signs to look for in children that could indicate a potential problematic outside influence, preventative options that parents may wish to consider to minimize risks, potential future issues with emerging technology and potentially helpful resources. **PLEASE PLAN ON ATTENDING THIS EVENT—ALL PARENTS NEED TO HEAR THIS INFORMATION.**

Does your child need some additional help with school work? If so, don't forget that tutoring is available every Tuesday and Thursday mornings from 8:00-8:30. Students need to bring their questions to the tutoring session and the teachers will assist them. This service is free to all students.

Our 8th grade students will be taking the PSAT on October 11 beginning first hour in the morning. If a student is absent, they will not be able to make up the test. The PSAT is an indicator for students in regard to how ready are you for college? Naturally, this test is the Pre-SAT so students have an opportunity of taking other tests in the Suite of Assessments as they proceed through high school.

As we come close to the end of the first nine-week period, please make sure you are checking your child's grades. If you are seeing a concern with your child's academic performance and have questions, please contact the teacher and/or your child's school counselor. We, as a staff, are here to provide a quality education for your child. Yes, they will be challenged this year as we move through the curriculum. There are a lot of excellent things that take place at school daily, so please ask your child what they are doing in their classes.

Safety....if you are picking your child up during the day, please send in a note to the office first thing in the morning. Once you arrive at school, please enter door J and ring the bell on the column and sign your child out on the sheet provided. Your child will be waiting for you in the main office area. Also, parents are not allowed to enter the building and walk to your child's classes prior to the start of the day. All visitors in the building must have a "Visitors pass" which indicates that you have been checked and have been approved to be in the facility. Without this pass, you will be directed back to the office. Thanks for helping keep ALL students safe at CMS.

On Wednesday, October 11, 8th grade students will have the opportunity to take the PSAT 8/9, an important test that provides many benefits that can help him or her along the path to college.

The PSAT 8/9 is a test that will help your child and your child's teacher(s) figure out what they need to work on most so that they are ready for college upon graduating from high school. Essentially, the PSAT 8/9 tests the same skills and knowledge as the SAT, PSAT/NMSQT, and PSAT 10 in a way that makes sense for the 8th grade student.

In addition, one of the other benefits of taking this test is that the PSAT 8/9 establishes a baseline measurement of your child's college and career readiness as they get ready to enter high school. The PSAT 8/9 also serves as a preview for the SAT and additional standardized tests.

Students will test in their advisory classes on Wednesday, and the test will last approximately two and a half hours. The PSAT 8/9 features two sections: a reading/writing section and one math section.

Please encourage your child to do the best they can on this assessment. Again, the test provides important results for students as they begin to plan their high school classes and schedules.





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5th grade Bullying Presentation

During the last week in September, the counselors gave a bullying presentation to all 5th grade students. The students came down to the LGI where the counselors walked the students through things like understanding the difference between being mean, rude or bullying behaviors. Also discussed were topics such as being a bystander or an upstander, and how to help yourself in that type of situation. The students offered great feedback and participated well.

6th/7th/8th grade Bullying Information

Students in grades 6, 7, and 8 were given information about bullying through one of their advisory lessons during the first week of October. It is always great for students to review the concepts of bullying behaviors and how they can help stop those actions from happening.

College Go Week!

College Go Week was recognized during the week of October 2nd. Each grade level participated in different activities in their Monday and Thursday advisory classes. Activities included taking a career interest survey, learning about apprenticeship programs, researching information about careers and looking up information on a college of choice and creating a college pennant. Students also were able to dress up to a different theme each day Monday through Thursday of that week, such as dressing for a job interview or their future occupation.

PSAT testing

On Wednesday, October 11, 2023, our 8th grade students will be taking the PSAT. The PSAT is a standardized test, measuring reading, writing and math skills. Here are some "fast facts" from the College Board:

The PSAT 8/9 tests your child's reading, writing, and math skills.

The questions on the PSAT 8/9 are grade-appropriate for eighth and ninth graders.

PSAT 8/9 scores aren't sent to colleges.

After students receive their scores, they can create an account and link into the College Board website to get free help to strengthen those academic areas, as well as use it for researching future careers.

Red Ribbon Week

Activities for Red Ribbon Week will take place the week of October 23rd. There will be pre-set activities in the Monday & Thursday advisory classes. In addition, students will be encouraged to participate each day in a dress up day—each day having a different theme. The advisory class, for each grade level, with the most total participation will earn a prize.

MABEL SALMEN 7TH GRADE



Ultimate Air Dogs was started in 2005 by former Detroit Tigers pitcher Milt Wilcox and his son Brian. There are events all over the country throughout the year (<http://www.ultimateairdogs.com/schedule.html>) which all lead up to the national event called the "Ultimate Air Games" held in Lebanon, TN, just outside of Nashville. Over 300 dogs competed at this year's event which was held Sept 28-Oct 1.

This is Mabel's 2nd year qualifying for Nationals with Diesel in "Distance Jumping" for Junior Handlers (handlers being 16y and under). Diesel is a Parson Russell Terrier weighing 17 pounds and under 16 inches in height. Distance jumping has the dog run down a dock and fly into a pool with the distance judged from the end of the dock to the base of the dog's tail. There is a qualifying round and then the finals. As you can imagine, larger dogs usually have an advantage over smaller dogs to go farther, but Diesel definitely holds his own with a personal best of 20 feet. Mabel competed against a lot of tough competitors, including a German Short-Haired Pointer named Chicken with a personal best of 28 feet. Mabel and Diesel took 4th place overall! Clark is proud to call Mabel a COYOTE!

What Is a SEPAC?

Parent participation is one of the six components of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). A Special Education Parent Advisory Committee (SEPAC) is a collaboration between the school district and parents to identify unmet needs, celebrate victories, and help shape the development of programs, services, and policies.

The mission of the LCSC-SEPAC is to facilitate collaboration and communication between students, parents/guardians, staff, and administration to promote inclusion, understanding of, respect for, and supports for all children in need of special services in our community.

The LCSC-SEPAC is an all-volunteer organization that works to collaboratively engage interested parties and deliver appropriate services to students with IEPs and 504 plans through advice and resources and working WITH the school corporation to enact change and improve the quality of district-wide services, policies, programs, and practices.

What We Do:

- Empower parents/guardians to help their children grow within our schools and communities
- Provide a forum for parents to ask questions, get answers, and discuss concerns collaboratively with the school district
- Meet regularly with district administrators to discuss general education and special services, policies, and programs.

BENEFITS:

- **Outreach** – engage families of students with disabilities so they are involved in shaping local special education programs and collaborative efforts with the school corporation
- **Positive Relationships** – parents and school corporation establish shared goals for the benefit of students with disabilities in the corporation
- **Collaborative Problem Solving** – the LCSC SEPAC thrives on team spirit and team action – different perspectives and collaboration towards a common mission – improve outcomes for ALL students receiving special education services and support
- **System Change Based on Input** – parents have a positive input and resource to advise school leaders on unmet needs
- **Information Sharing** – provide an opportunity for districts to share information with parents about instructional programs, available supports, and other matters related to special education
- **Deepened Respect and Trust** – overtime, parents and school corporations working together builds trust
- **Improved Services and Programs**

FEMA and FCC Plan Nationwide Emergency Alert Test for Oct. 4, 2023

Release Date: August 3, 2023

Test Messages Will be Sent to All TVs, Radios and Cell Phones

WASHINGTON -- FEMA, in coordination with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC), will conduct a nationwide test of the Emergency Alert System (EAS) and Wireless Emergency Alerts (WEA) this fall.

The national test will consist of two portions, testing WEA and EAS capabilities. Both tests are scheduled to begin at approximately 2:20 p.m. ET on Wednesday, Oct. 4.

The WEA portion of the test will be directed to all consumer cell phones. This will be the third nationwide test, but the second test to all cellular devices. The test message will display in either English or in Spanish, depending on the language settings of the wireless handset.

The EAS portion of the test will be sent to radios and televisions. This will be the seventh nationwide EAS test.

FEMA and the FCC are coordinating with EAS participants, wireless providers, emergency managers and other stakeholders in preparation for this national test to minimize confusion and to maximize the public safety value of the test.

The purpose of the Oct. 4 test is to ensure that the systems continue to be effective means of warning the public about emergencies, particularly those on the national level. In case the Oct. 4 test is postponed due to widespread severe weather or other significant events, the back-up testing date is Oct. 11.

The WEA portion of the test will be initiated using FEMA's Integrated Public Alert and Warning System (IPAWS), a centralized internet-based system administered by FEMA that enables authorities to send authenticated emergency messages to the public through multiple communications networks. The WEA test will be

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administered via a code sent to cell phones.

This year the EAS message will be disseminated as a Common Alerting Protocol (CAP) message via the Integrated Public Alert and Warning System-Open Platform for Emergency Networks (IPAWS-OPEN).

All wireless phones should receive the message only once. The following can be expected from the nationwide WEA test:

- Beginning at approximately 2:20 p.m. ET, cell towers will broadcast the test for approximately 30 minutes. During this time, WEA-compatible wireless phones that are switched on, within range of an active cell tower, and whose wireless provider participates in WEA, should be capable of receiving the test message.
- For consumers, the message that appears on their phones will read: "THIS IS A TEST of the National Wireless Emergency Alert System. No action is needed."
- Phones with the main menu set to Spanish will display: "ESTA ES UNA PRUEBA del Sistema Nacional de Alerta de Emergencia. No se necesita acción."

WEA alerts are created and sent by authorized federal, state, local, tribal and territorial government agencies through IPAWS to participating wireless providers, which deliver the alerts to compatible handsets in geo-targeted areas. To help ensure that these alerts are accessible to the entire public, including people with disabilities, the alerts are accompanied by a unique tone and vibration.

Important information about the EAS test:

- The EAS portion of the test is scheduled to last approximately one minute and will be conducted with the participation of radio and television broadcasters, cable systems, satellite radio and television providers and wireline video providers.
- The test message will be similar to the regular monthly EAS test messages with which the public is familiar. It will state: "This is a nationwide test of the Emergency Alert System, issued by the Federal Emergency Management Agency, covering the United States from 14:20 to 14:50 hours ET. This is only a test. No action is required by the public."
