

It is hard to believe we are already in September! I wanted to take a moment and discuss the importance of consistent school attendance.

Students who attend school regularly have been shown to achieve at higher levels than students who do not have regular attendance. This relationship between attendance and achievement may appear early in a child's school career. On the other hand, poor attendance has serious implications for later outcomes as well. The effects of lost school days build up one absence at a time on individual students.

Per the Lake Central Middle School Handbook, attendance is required of all students. Lake Central does consider things such as illness and funerals as excused absences so long as they are verified with a parent phone call. However, per the Indiana Department of Education, a student is considered chronically absent after missing 10 percent or more of school days. This includes both excused and unexcused absences. We do not want to see any student fall into this category of "chronically absent."



Hello Lake Central Families,

I'm reaching out with an important topic: Indiana schools are required by law to provide age-appropriate and research and evidence-based instruction on child abuse and child sexual abuse to students in kindergarten through grade 12. This is to occur annually by December 15, per Indiana Code (IC) 20-30-5-5.7. Instruction on child abuse and child sexual abuse may be delivered by a school safety specialist, school counselor, or any other person with training and expertise in the area of child abuse and child sexual abuse.

This year, the **high school** and **all three middle schools** will be using the *MBF Child Safety Matters*® program from the Monique Burr Foundation for Children. Presentations have been scheduled at the high school and middle schools, and you will soon be receiving an opt out form that contains information about the program, the date of the presentation at your child's school, and an opt out form that you can fill out and send back to the school if you do not want your child to participate. The goal of the program is to help keep your child safe.

We are hosting a **parent information night** on Thursday, September 12, 2024 at 6:00pm, in the Lake Central High School LGI room for parents of students in **grades 5-12**. This parent night is ahead of any presentations at the schools, and our intent is to provide you with information about the content shared at each level (5-12) and answer any questions you may have. Sara Hoyt will be the presenter for the middle schools and high school, and she will be the one presenting at the parent night.

Prior to scheduling the student presentations here at Lake Central, school counselors and I attended every grade level presentation (grades 5-8 separately and then the high school presentation) in other districts. The counselors and I were so impressed with not only this program, but with Sara Hoyt's delivery and the engagement level of the students. The content is age appropriate, and the vocabulary varies for each grade level. I left each presentation with information I had not thought to share with my own children... and I immediately went home to talk to my kids. As a parent, I feel empowered with appropriate language, content, and guidance to help keep my kids safe. I want to offer you this same opportunity via a parent night by putting the presenter who will be in front of your kids in front of you.

The program empowers children to spot and respond to bullying, cyberbullying, child abuse, and digital dangers. Most importantly, it teaches that adults are responsible for their safety but there are things they can do to help adults keep them safe. The program is based on the latest research and has been reviewed and endorsed by national experts. You can learn more about the program at www.mbfpreventioneducation.org.


