




I also want to remind everyone that Skyward is the best place to check for current grades. Canvas is a great resource to see what is happening daily in the classroom.

5th grade Bullying Presentation

October 2nd and 3rd, the counselors gave a bullying presentation to all 5th grade students. 

Understanding Absences

Exempt vs. Excused vs. Unexcused

State of Indiana Attendance Expectation: 94% (10 or fewer days missed per year)

Exempt	Excused	Unexcused
Pre-Arranged Exempt Absences per Indiana Code: Page for General Assembly Election Day Worker Court Witness IN National Guard Active Duty Civil Air Patrol Educationally related non-classroom activity as defined in IC 20-33-2-17.5 Exhibiting/participating in state fair	An excused absence occurs when a parent or guardian chooses to keep their student home in the student's best interest. Acceptable reasons include: Illness (parent verified) Verified medical visit (note must be returned within 1 week or absence will be unexcused) School sends the student home sick Professional appointments (medical, dental, legal) Peath in the family Religious holiday Military connected families' absences related to deployment A parent/guardian must notify the school on the day of the absence.	Students should have ZERO unexcused absence is any absence that is not classified as exempt, excused, or is not verified within 24 hours of an absence (i.e.the school was not notified in time). If a student accumulates 5 unexcused absences within a 9 week grading period, an attendance meeting will be held, as required by law. A student who accumulates 10 or more unexcused absences is considered habitually truant and will be referred to juvenile services in accordance with Indiana Code 20-33-2-25.

A student who misses 10% or more of the school year for any reason (18 days) is considered <u>chronically absent</u> by the state of Indiana. After 18 total absences, all absences beyond that will be marked as unexcused.
